



Getting Around

Most areas in the Southern part of the island are serviced by “ride” apps, such as **Go-Jek** and **GRAB**, enabling you to easily pick up transport where and when easily and at very affordable rates, therefore you might consider whether or not it is necessary to have a car for yourself.

Hazards of driving yourself in Indonesia, no matter whose fault it is normally the rule of thumb is it's the larger vehicles fault in an accident, so even if a motorbike drives into you, it could be your fault and you would be liable for all the expenses including hospital bills for the third party.

Insurance – most people are driving without any insurance, so you have to understand the liability you are under.

Licenses – a foreigner should only drive on an International license for a maximum of 3 months technically they should get an Indonesian license which can only be obtained with an ITAS visa (one year)

Hire Car – should you want to explore further afield there are plenty of car hire places with or without drivers where you can rent a car for exploring further afield.

Scooters – unless you are an experienced rider, scooters can be hazardous with the many potholes, ignorance of general road rules, and lack of use of mirrors.
